

#### CHAPLAINCY NOTICES: NOVEMBER



November, the 11 Month of the year is filled with days of Religious, Spiritual and National significance.



#### November days of Religious Significance

November 12 – Diwali: A 5-day festival celebrated by Hindus, Sikhs, and Jains. Known as the festival of life it honours gods, goddesses, harvests, New Years.

November 27 – Jain New Year: A day celebrated on the first day after the month of Kartika.

November 30 – St. Andrew's Feast Day: St. Andrew is the patron saint of Scotland, Greece, Russia, Ukraine, Barbados, and Romania. This day honours him, his good works, and his canonization in the Catholic Church.



#### November 2: All Souls Day.

All Souls' Day, also called The Commemoration of All the Faithful Departed, is a day of prayer and remembrance for honouring the dead, the faithful departed. The day is primarily celebrated in the **Roman Catholic Church**, but it is also celebrated in the **Eastern Orthodox Church** and a few other denominations of Christianity. Through prayer, intercessions, alms and visits to cemeteries, people commemorate the poor souls in purgatory.

The tradition of offering prayers for the deceased has its roots in old writings, particularly in 2 Maccabees 12:42–46;

<sup>46</sup> It is therefore a holy and wholesome thought to pray for the dead, that they may be loosed from sins.

During this month Christians will make an extra effort to remember those they have lost.

#### Prayer for the faithful departed;

Eternal rest grant unto them, O Lord, and let perpetual light shine upon them. May the souls of all the faithful departed, through the mercy of God, rest in peace.



<u>British Values</u>: Remembrance Day is a memorial day observed in the UK and Commonwealth member states since the end of the First World War. The day honours armed forces members who have died in the line of duty. *Remembrance Sunday* is also marked each year, and usually falls on the second Sunday in November.

A 2 minute silence is observed .

Remembrance Sunday is a national opportunity to remember the service and sacrifice of all those that have defended our freedoms and protected our way of life.

Many wear poppies as a sign of remembrance, appreciation, and hope.

#### NATIONAL CHEMISTRY WEEK 2023

# National Chemistry Week 2023 - 'Chemistry making the world a better place'

From the 6-10<sup>th</sup> November, at UAI, we celebrated Chemistry week organised by the Royal Society of Chemistry. Students in Years 7 to 13 enjoyed exciting practicals at lunchtime, form time PowerPoint presentations on careers, talks by sixth formers on what it is like to study A level Chemistry and why they chose to study the subject and a Chemistry kahoot competition.

Evaporation of original coke compared to diet coke showed the original drink left behind a large amount of sugar residue than the diet version, which surprised the students. They then used glucose strips to measure quantitatively the amount of glucose in a range of fizzy drinks and compared them. Measuring the pH of the fizzy drinks showed they were very acidic and have the ability to dissolve teeth if too much is drunk. Students were challenged to think about the potential health issues of fizzy drinks. This led to a discussion on damage caused to their teeth, obesity, and diabetes. Our future scientists, also, looked at sustainable ways



of preserving finite resources. They investigated making batteries from different fruits and plastics from starch obtained from potatoes. I received very positive comments about the classroom talks given by the sixth formers. The Kahoot was enjoyed by all those who attended. Well done all!

Many thanks to the A level Chemists for helping to run the event, the science department and all the form tutors for their support.


#### Dr Osei-Owusu, Acting Head of Science

'I went to Chemistry week, and it was so much fun. We did fun experiments like making energy from citrus fruits, flame test, acid and alkaline test and coke or diet coke which one has more sugar. In the flame test

we dipped a metal rod in a powder and then put it in the flame to see what colour it will be. In the alkaline and acid test we added a few drops of universal indicator to Coke, and it became red. I used the scale to measure, and it was pH 1. The best part for me was hard to pick but I will choose the flame test. I learnt that the powder can change the flame colour and how acidic coke is. It was an amazing experience, and I



will definitely go to Chemistry club every Tuesday.' Manahil Abid 77


Science News

Bath Bombs!

This week we got messy again and made bath bombs. These are still solidifying in the fridge as we speak but will be ready for the girls to take home soon. We even managed to use a heart shaped tray to give us the shape for the moulds. It is essentially several ingredients all mashed together into a particular shape including some food colouring and essences that will give it a nice smell. When dropped into water there will be a chemical reaction within the ingredients (notability the sodium bicarbonate and citric acid) and the water and we should get a lot of fizzing!

# Did you know...just registering your daughter for Free School Meals means that our school gets extra money!!

You can register your daughter for Free School Meals if you receive any of these benefits:

• Universal Credit (provided you have an annual net earned income of no more than £7,400, as assessed by earnings from up to three of your most recent assessment periods)

- Income Support
- Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance
- Income-related Employment and Support Allowance
- Support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- The guarantee element of Pension Credit

• Child Tax Credit (provided you're not also entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual gross income of no more than £16,190)

• Working Tax Credit run-on – paid for four weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit

If you want your daughter to have a free, healthy meal at lunchtime that's great – she will get a free meal (saving you more than £400 per year!). There is NO stigma attached and no one will know because we operate a cashless payment system in our Dining Hall.

If you qualify but don't want your daughter to have Free School Meals, please still register as the school will get additional funding. Your daughter can still continue to have her packed lunch as normal!

To apply please complete the on-line Free School Meals application on the Redbridge.gov.uk website. You can apply regardless of which borough you live in because your daughter attends a school in Redbridge. It is a simple 1-page form, so don't delay, apply today!!

It is important to note that:

- Taking the meal is recommended but not compulsory
- Your daughter may receive additional help as a result of being registered, for example, help with the cost of music lessons or school trips
- No one will know and it will not affect any other benefits you are claiming
- Registering your daughter for Free School Meals will bring in more money to our school. Thank you for your co-operation!
