in Paradise.


3rd December: Let them set their hopes on high and not on earth.

The Advent season

Advent is a four-week season in the Church calendar dedicated to anticipating the arrival, or "advent," of Jesus of Nazareth, the long-awaited Messiah and King.

Christians from many backgrounds celebrate this time with reflections on hope, peace, love, and joy. And while their practices may look different, all focus on the hope-filled arrival of Jesus.

The Season always begins 4 Sundays before Christmas. Traditionally each week a different Candle of the Advent Wreath is lit to symbolise the theme of the week

The First day of Advent is also the first day of a new Liturgical Year in the Church It is a season of Penance when Christians try to be more Pray-ful in order to 'receive Jesus' once again.

December, the last month of the year is filled with expectations of Christmas, festivities and the joy of the season.




December days of Religious Significance

8 December: The Immaculate Conception of Mary. The day honours the belief that Mary was born without sin from the day of her conception.

12 December: Hannukah: Jewish festival observed for 8 days. Sometimes called 'the festival of lights'. Acknowledges that light in the Temple continuously burning for 8 days after a foreign invasion.

25 December: Christmas Day: Annual festival commemorating the birth of Jesus Christ. Celebrated as the Feast of the Nativity in the Western Church.





Christmas is an annual festival commemorating the Birth of Jesus Christ, observed primarily on December 25, Christmas Day, as a religious and cultural celebration among billions of Christians around the world.

A feast central to the Christian liturgical year, it follows the season of Advent, which begins 4 Sundays before, or the Nativity fast, and initiates the season of Christmastide, which historically in the Western Church lasts 12 days and cumulates on the Twelfth Night, January 5.

January 5 is also known as the Epiphany Eve. These days from December 25- January 5 are popularly known as the 12 Days of Christmas.

Christmas day is celebrated around the world culturally by many non-Christians as a season of 'good will' and celebration.

Parent Governor Wanted!

Have you ever thought about becoming a school governor?

As a Governor, you are a member of the governing body, which is a corporate team. The governing body works with the headteacher to set high expectations and drive

school improvement. Governors enable the school to run as effectively as possible, working alongside senior leaders.

Being a governor provides an opportunity for personal development, building your skills and experience in areas such as project management, budgeting, and working as part of a leadership team. Most importantly you will gain an insight into the operation of the school, influence decisions on how the school operates, provide constructive challenge, and play a vital role in making sure every child gets the best possible education.

The Ursuline's Governing Body consists of Parent Governors, Foundation Governors, Co-Opted Governors, Staff Governors, and the school's Senior Leadership Team.

If you would like to make a difference and join the Governing Board, we will shortly have a vacancy for a Parent Governor.

One of our Parent Governors' terms of office is shortly due to expire, and whilst they have indicated they would be willing to serve for a further term of 4 years, they would be happy to step aside for another parent to take over. In the interest of transparency, we are therefore opening the vacancy up to our parent body. If you would be interested applying for the role, please could you complete the form below and return to Mrs Herbert, P A to the Headteacher, before 15th December. If more than one parent applies, we will hold an election. If no, one applies, our existing governor will serve a further term, as they would be deemed to be elected unopposed.

What are the time commitments?

The average Governor role will take up to 10 hours a term including attending one governing body meeting per term and typically, serving on one committee. You will need to be able to attend meetings regularly and have time to read the paperwork and get to know the school well.

You are also expected to demonstrate commitment to fulfilling your role responsibly through your ongoing training and development. A range of governor training, including Induction and online learning, are available and will be provided.

Well done Year 9s! You worked very hard on these projects!








Science News

Daphnia - Water Fleas

Hello, my name is Maeve, and I am a freshman student at Ursuline Academy Wilmington Delaware. Currently in Theology we are doing a project on different Ursuline schools all over the world. I have been assigned to The Ursuline Academy Ilford and I have a couple of questions regarding your school.

Are there any special traditions? At my Ursuline Academy we have some special traditions including junior ring mass which is when an alumnae gives a class ring to the junior class. *One of our favourite school traditions is our badge commissioning service. Each Year 7 student receives their Ursuline Academy Badge at the beginning of the year, which they then wear on the lapel of their school blazer for the whole time they are in school. It is a really nice event. We are also looking forward to our annual Christmas Carol Service this year.*

What is your heritage or history? Our school was established in 1903 and is very proud of its history. We are inspired by our founder Angela Merici and our motto "SERVIAM" which means I will serve. We learn about (and sing about) those who have gone before us and think of past pupils and teachers at our school. A phrase that we often hear among student who visit is "Once and Ursuline always and Ursuline!"

What's your overview of St. Ursula? We know that St Ursula was a Christina Martyr who died for her faith. She may have died in Germany with many others who refused to marry a group of men who travelled from Central Asia and conquered Europe in that time.

Do you have any special prayers? Yes, we say our school prayer in assembly and also at the beginning of each lesson. Our school prayer is imbedded in the whole school photo on page 2 of our weekly Newsletter and is also replicated below.

Do students go on any retreats? Currently our senior class is on a retreat. Each year group goes on retreat throughout the year. We go to Walsingham house at Abbotswick, and we also invite the Christian Education Project to our school where they practice lots of fun, reflecting activities based on different themes. Last year's theme was based on the light in our lives!

Do you have a special song? Our special song is called "Insieme". We love to sing in our year group assemblies every morning. We love to sing "Standing on the Shoulders" and "My Lighthouse" Our school band and gospel choir prepare these songs together and we encourage everyone to join in!

What's your school mascot and school colors? We are the UA Raiders, and our colors are red and white. Our school colours are navy and green. We feel part of a very special community here and like to say, "Once an Ursuline always an Ursuline".

Do you have any school sports? We are big on basketball, and volleyball. Yes, we really love Netball at our school, and we love running. We train after school and take part in lots of different events. We also have a girl's football team who play throughout the year.

The Ursuline Academy Ilford looks like an enjoyable environment, and I hope to learn more about your school. #UAsisterhood

The HAF Winter Fun Day is part of the Holiday Activities and Food (HAF) Programme and is available for children and young people who are eligible for benefits related free school meals.





<u>Did you know...just registering your daughter for Free School Meals</u> means that our school gets extra money!!

You can register your daughter for Free School Meals if you receive any of these benefits:

- Universal Credit (provided you have an annual net earned income of no more than £7,400, as assessed by earnings from up to three of your most recent assessment periods)
- Income Support
- Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance
- Income-related Employment and Support Allowance
- Support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- The guarantee element of Pension Credit
- Child Tax Credit (provided you're not also entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual gross income of no more than £16,190)
- Working Tax Credit run-on paid for four weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit

If you want your daughter to have a free, healthy meal at lunchtime that's great – she will get a free meal (saving you more than £400 per year!). There is NO stigma attached and no one will know because we operate a cashless payment system in our Dining Hall.

If you qualify but don't want your daughter to have Free School Meals, please still register as the school will get additional funding. Your daughter can still continue to have her packed lunch as normal!

To apply please complete the on-line Free School Meals application on the Redbridge.gov.uk website. You can apply regardless of which borough you live in because your daughter attends a school in Redbridge. It is a simple 1-page form, so don't delay, apply today!!

It is important to note that:

- Taking the meal is recommended but not compulsory
- Your daughter may receive additional help as a result of being registered, for example, help with the cost of music lessons or school trips
- No one will know and it will not affect any other benefits you are claiming
- Registering your daughter for Free School Meals will bring in more money to our school. Thank you for your co-operation!

University of East London Psychology Masterclasses

The <u>School of Psychology</u> is hosting a series of webinar masterclasses on Thursday afternoons this November and December. Join us for discussions on adversity, rebelliousness and making better decisions.

Thursday 30th November 4-5pm

Psychology of sport and overcoming adversity - <u>Dr Hanna Kampman</u>

The ability to overcome and succeed in the face of challenges is potentially an essential part of being a successful sportsperson. In this talk, Dr Hanna Kampman will explore how psychology has studied our ability to overcome adversity, and talk about examples of how to put this into practice.

Thursday 7th December 4-5pm

The Psychology of Rebelliousness - Prof Mark McDermott

This talk will give a brief overview of how psychologists have tried to understand conformity, and focus on the psychology of rebellion. What are the conditions that promote principled rebellion against an unjust and unreasonable authority? Are there differences between individuals in their readiness to rebel? What types of rebelliousness have been identified? Does a disposition to rebel change across the lifespan? How can rebelliousness be a force for good? In this talk, Prof Mark McDermott will address these and other issues relating to the psychology of rebelliousness, of going against the grain.

Thursday 14th December 4-5pm

Psychology of decision making - Prof Volker Thoma

Decision-making is an everyday occurrence and experience for us – but how does the mind make judgments and then decide? And how good are our decisions? In this talk, Prof Volker Thoma will show you examples of how psychologists have tackled these questions with some surprising demonstrations.
