Lunchtime: Where students are permitted to be at lunchtime:

- Students can go to the three main areas at lunchtime: Canteen, Main Hall or playground / courtyard.
- Students may go to a room where they are engaged in a specific club or extra-curricular activity that is supervised by a member of staff e.g. IT club, Library, Revision clubs etc.
- Students are not permitted to stay in corridors, stairwells or classes where they have not been given explicit permission to be there – these areas are out of bounds.
- Where students are found to be in areas considered out of bounds at lunchtime and cannot provide a valid reason for this, they will be issued with a demerit.

**14**<sup>th</sup> **December**: Put all your zeal and strength into carrying out your duty.








Our Advent Calendar continues this week...



#### **Archives Live**

On Monday 4<sup>th</sup> December A Level History students had the opportunity to take part in an online seminar hosted by The National Archives, in which Dr Tracey Borman, esteemed Tudor historian, talked us through some of her favourite Tudor documents in the archives. It was a fantastic event, and Dr Borman's love for her work really shone through. Students were able to try their hand at palaeography, attempting to decode 16<sup>th</sup> century handwriting, and see some excellent examples of the famous Tudor propaganda machine. A highlight was seeing a letter from Robert Dudley (Elizabeth's rumoured lover) to Elizabeth I, written in 1588. The contents of the letter were not particularly noteworthy, but on the back of the letter Elizabeth I had written 'his last letter', as he had died a few days after it was sent. Elizabeth kept the letter in a locked box by the side of her bed until her own death in 1603, in a clear demonstration of her love for him. The letter serves as a reminder that people in the past were just like us, which can sometimes be forgotten.

#### **Student responses:**

'My favourite document was Valor Ecclesiasticus (Henry VIII's survey into the wealth of the monasteries, before their dissolution in the 1530s), as it is a great example of Tudor propaganda and art. It makes me wonder what methods were used to produce the documents, the art is of such a high standard' **Obichi Duru Year 13** 

'My favourite part was Dudley's letter to Elizabeth, which was his last letter before his death. The fact that is was so well preserved is amazing to me' **Alisha Qureshi, Year 13** 

'I particularly enjoyed the depiction of Henry VIII in the Valor Ecclesiasticus, I was intrigued by the use of gold as propaganda to portray Henry's wealth and majesty' **Anoosha Jawad, Year 13**

### a lifetime of possibilities

Christmas is a time for family and sharing stories. Our latest research shows that <u>almost a million children</u> in the UK say they don't have a single book of their own at home.



Young children who don't own books are less confident readers. Children who struggle with reading and literacy are likely to do worse at school. They are also less likely to get good qualifications, or a good job when they leave school.

At the National Literacy Trust, we know the power of reading for pleasure. In a book, children can discover

new worlds, meet new people and learn about the past. It can spark their imaginations and help them develop empathy.

### **Science News**

### Magic Milk!

This week we tried to get messy with milk and washing up liquid.

Milk is made up of minerals, proteins, and fats. Proteins and fats are susceptible to changes. When washing up liquid is added to the milk, the soap molecules run around and try to attach to the fat molecules in the milk.



However, you wouldn't see this change happen without the food colouring! The food colouring looks like fireworks because it's getting bumped around, a colour explosion.

The soap lowers the surface tension of the milk. When the soap molecules head for the fats, they form spherical micelles. This causes movement and creates cool bursts and swirls of colour. After all the fat molecules have been found and equilibrium has been reached, there is no more movement.

# <u>Did you know...just registering your daughter for Free School Meals</u> means that our school gets extra money!!

You can register your daughter for Free School Meals if you receive any of these benefits:

- Universal Credit (provided you have an annual net earned income of no more than £7,400, as assessed by earnings from up to three of your most recent assessment periods)
- Income Support
- Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance
- Income-related Employment and Support Allowance
- Support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- The guarantee element of Pension Credit
- Child Tax Credit (provided you're not also entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual gross income of no more than £16,190)
- Working Tax Credit run-on paid for four weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit

If you want your daughter to have a free, healthy meal at lunchtime that's great – she will get a free meal (saving you more than £400 per year!). There is NO stigma attached and no one will know because we operate a cashless payment system in our Dining Hall.

If you qualify but don't want your daughter to have Free School Meals, please still register as the school will get additional funding. Your daughter can still continue to have her packed lunch as normal!

To apply please complete the on-line Free School Meals application on the Redbridge.gov.uk website. You can apply regardless of which borough you live in because your daughter attends a school in Redbridge. It is a simple 1-page form, so don't delay, apply today!!

#### It is important to note that:

- Taking the meal is recommended but not compulsory
- Your daughter may receive additional help as a result of being registered, for example, help with the cost of music lessons or school trips
- No one will know and it will not affect any other benefits you are claiming
- Registering your daughter for Free School Meals will bring in more money to our school. Thank you for your co-operation!
