Artists of the Month

This month, we celebrate the outstanding creativity and versatility of **Alina Pynkevych** and **Amani Rahman**, two talented artists who have embraced new mediums and techniques to create strikingly different yet equally captivating works.



Alina Pynkevych: A Masterful Tribute to Tradition

Alina Pynkevych has taken inspiration from the great master painters, producing a stunning still-life oil painting that radiates timeless elegance. Using the chiaroscuro technique, Alina masterfully contrasts light and shadow, giving her work a dramatic depth and three-dimensionality reminiscent of classical art. Her love for oil paints is evident in her seamless blending, which adds a soft, realistic quality to her piece.



Amani Rahman: Bold Modernity in Every Detail

In stark contrast, Amani Rahman's modern approach is a vibrant explosion of colour and creativity. Her piece, featuring multicolour energy drink cans, is a bold representation of contemporary culture. Amani's intricate attention to detail and skilful use of blurring effects create a dynamic quality.

Curwen Printing Centre Trip

This month our Year 11 art students have had the opportunity to try drypoint printing at the Curwen Print Centre. For many of students, it was their first time trying this method of printing.

Drypoint etching is a technique where a design is etched onto acetate using a special needle. After etching, a thin layer of ink is spread across the acetate plate and any excess ink is cleaned off. This is then placed onto a damp piece of paper and the sheets are put through a printing press between blankets and larger sheets of paper. The end result is a printed design made of beautifully textured lines.



The girls were also introduced to a printing technique called 'Chine Colle', this is when a thin, coloured piece of paper is cut into a specific shape and is bonded to the printing paper after it gets passed through the rolling press.

The tutors at the workshop had expansive knowledge on printing and did an excellent job at assisting the students, providing them with appropriate materials, advice and newfound knowledge.



The introduction of these techniques allowed the girls to explore more diversely with their work and will hopefully make them feel less afraid to try new things with their art in the future. They created multiple prints at the workshop and will be using the prints to show development and experimentation in their GCSE coursework.

We have heard a lot of positive feedback from the year 11's about the workshop. Many have stated that drypoint printing was a very new and unfamiliar technique, but they liked learning about the process and enjoyed being able to try something different for their art.

A big thank you to the tutors at the Curwen Print Centre for organising the workshop, we would love to visit again.

These water fleas are classified as crustaceans and have transparent bodies, making them especially suitable for observation of internal organs. The students had a blast learning how to use pipettes, prepare depression slides, set up and focus a microscope. It was lovely to see how excited they were to explore the fascinating world of these tiny crustaceans and gain valuable observation skills in the process.

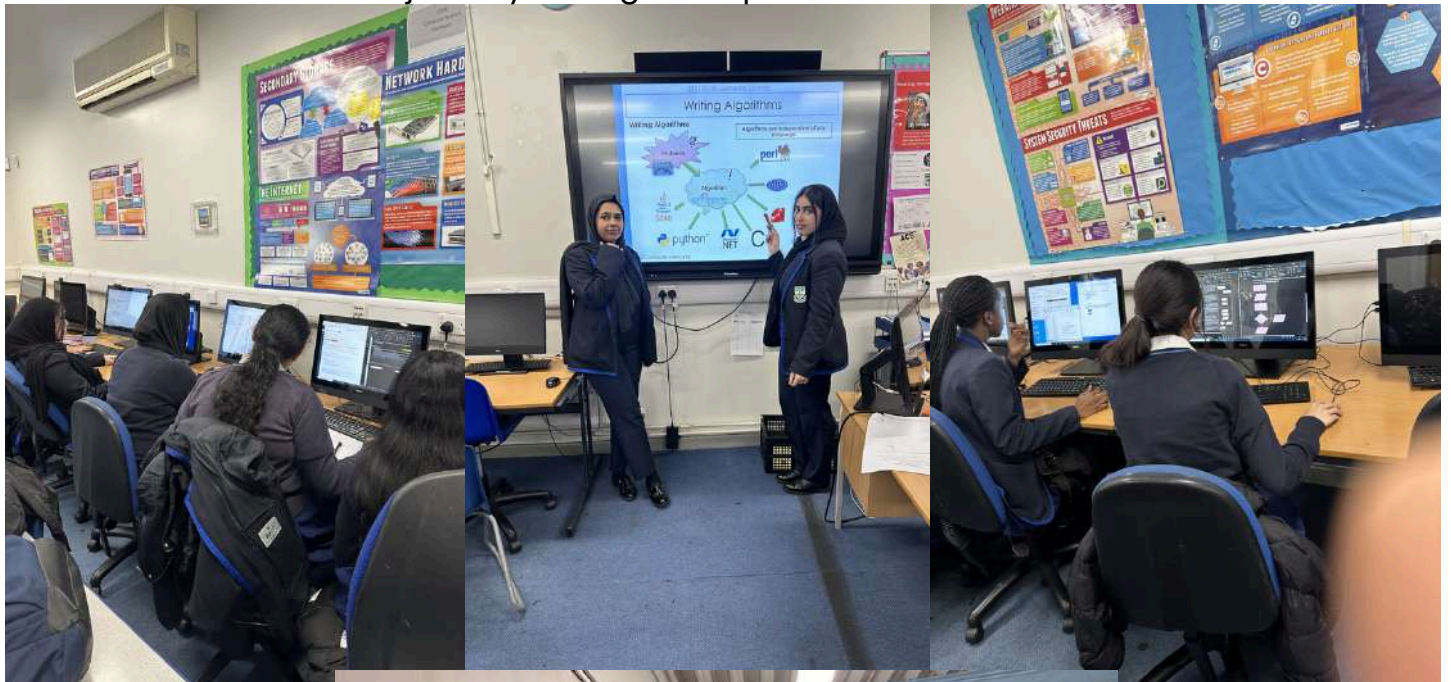


Computer Science News

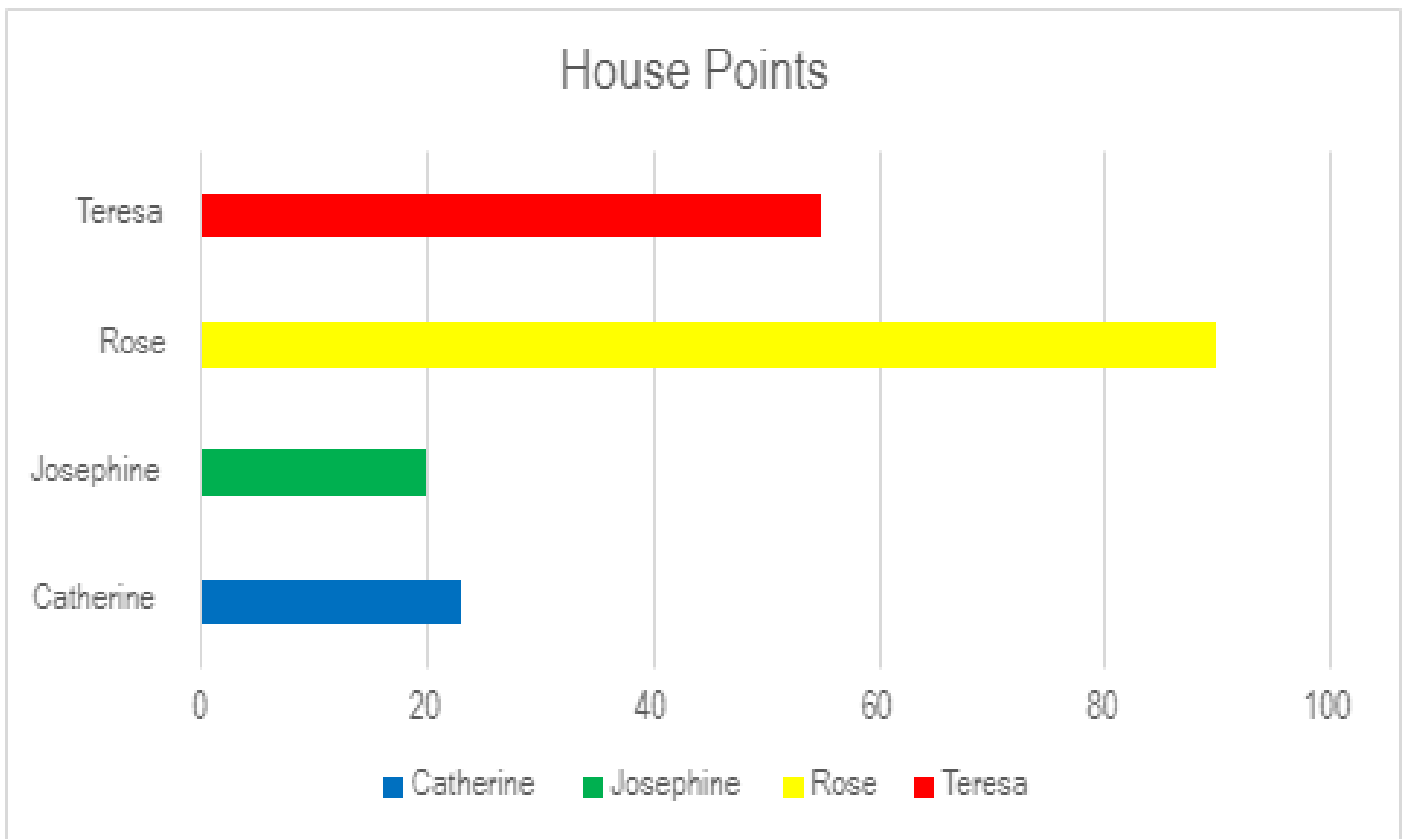


House Points

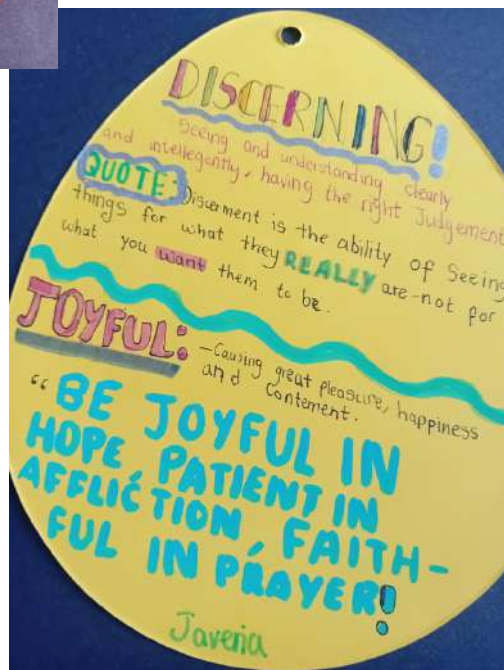
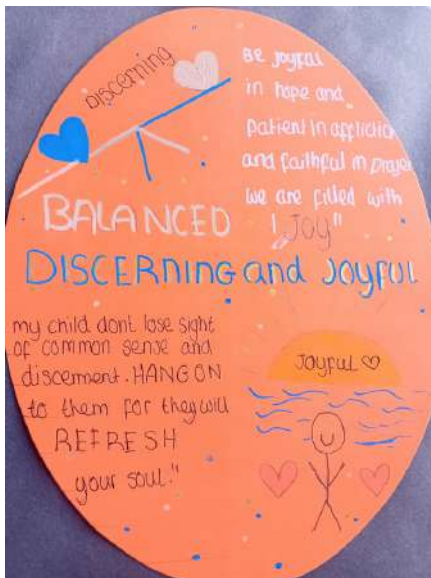
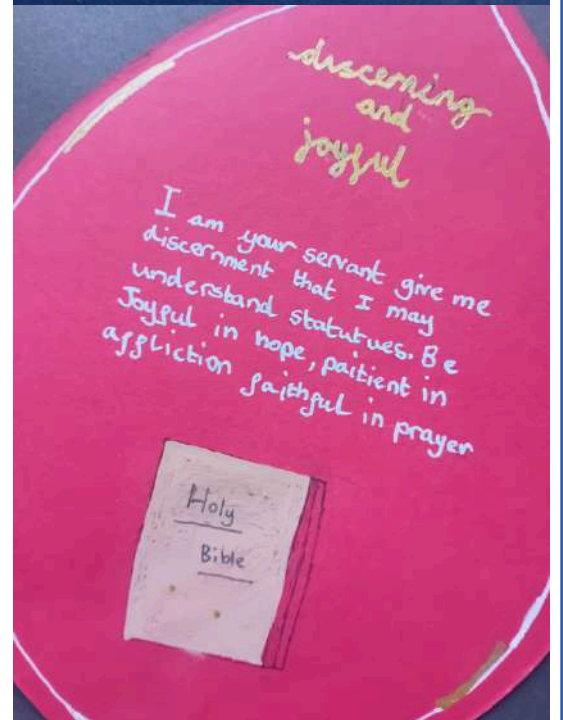


Ursuline Student Profile

Anything over this amount, or food taken at Breakfast or Morning Break, is not covered by the FSM entitlement.

Also, please be aware that we are a 'Nut Free School' please see below...



Schools & Nurseries

- As nut and peanut allergies are so prevalent in children and because of the risks of food sharing amongst pupils, Accent Catering have a nut free policy in all of our educational locations.
- Accent Catering operate a Nut Free Policy within all Education sites, our Chef / Catering Managers will not use recipes or products where "nuts" are an integral part of the dish.
- The instances of "may contain" or "produced in a factory which handles nuts" applies mainly to constituents of a meal, snack, sandwich (bakery goods) and biscuits. "These products are either identified on saffron database by a semi circle or on the wrapper."
- The child friendly 'Think Allergy' poster should be displayed in the servery area in a prominent position.
- It is the schools responsibility to inform Accent Catering of any children's dietary requirements.

The school should be encouraged to ensure that parents / guardians complete the Accent Catering Dietary Requirements Request Form (CD17) and permit direct communication with the parents / guardians.

- This form should be used as a template to gather information and provide an accurate account of any meetings in relation to Allergen controls relating to a specific person.
- As a minimum any dietary information should be provided in writing. For Primary Schools and Nursery's a recent photograph of the child should be supplied to enable staff to identify the child easily.
- Accent Catering will agree it's nut policy within education sites at a local level with each client and will therefore vary in application.
- This agreement must be agreed in writing and re-visited when anything significant changes.

Please refer to the Accent Manager's Guide to Allergens for more information. All Unit Managers and Senior team members are to read and complete the declaration of understanding and acceptance of the Company Allergen Policy.

Did you know...just registering your daughter for Free School Meals means that our school gets extra money!!

You can register your daughter for Free School Meals if you receive any of these benefits:

- Universal Credit (provided you have an annual net earned income of no more than £7,400, as assessed by earnings from up to three of your most recent assessment periods)
 - Income Support
 - Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance
 - Income-related Employment and Support Allowance
 - Support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
 - The guaranteed element of Pension Credit
- Child Tax Credit (provided you're not also entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual gross income of no more than £16,190)
- Working Tax Credit run-on – paid for four weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit

If you want your daughter to have a free, healthy meal at lunchtime that's great – she will get a free meal (saving you more than £400 per year!). There is NO stigma attached and no one will know because we operate a cashless payment system in our Dining Hall.

If you qualify but don't want your daughter to have Free School Meals, please still register as the school will get additional funding. Your daughter can still continue to have her packed lunch as normal!

To apply please complete the on-line Free School Meals application on the Redbridge.gov.uk website. You can apply regardless of which borough you live in because your daughter attends a school in Redbridge. It is a simple 1-page form, so don't delay, apply today!!

It is important to note that:

- Taking the meal is recommended but not compulsory
- Your daughter may receive additional help as a result of being registered, for example, help with the cost of music lessons or school trips
- No one will know and it will not affect any other benefits you are claiming
- Registering your daughter for Free School Meals will bring in more money to our school.
