Science Club

Making Salt from Acid

This week we made a salt using Sulphuric acid and Iron oxide. We added solid powder form of Iron Oxide to sulphuric acid and heated it in a beaker using a Bunsen burner. When the acid reacted fully with the solid Iron Oxide we were left with a salt solution which we filtered and evaporated using a evaporating dish to leave us with the salt. Very messy and while the salt was being formed had a lot of it spitting out at us as the reaction was finished. Good thing we were wearing goggles!

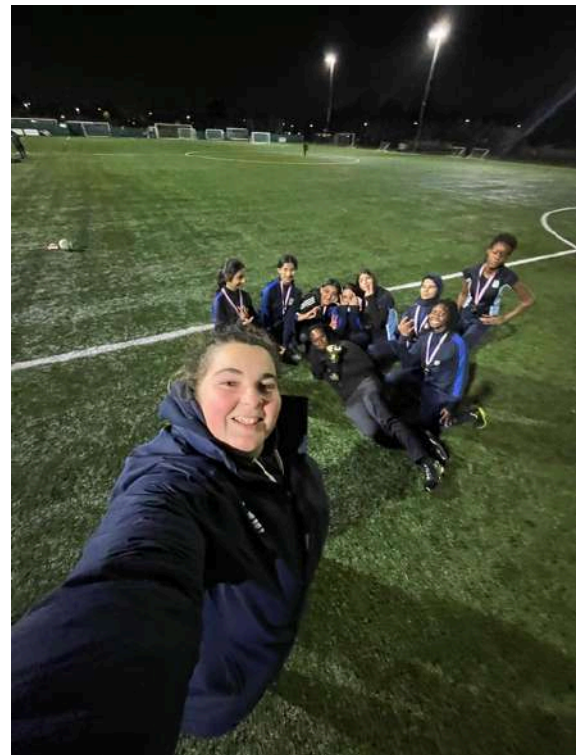

With the Iceland trip quickly approaching, I am excited to share some key updates and reminders to help you prepare.

Parent Meeting

Itinerary Overview

Students will explore Iceland's stunning geography, with highlights including:

- **Day 1:** Arrival in Keflavik, visit to the Bridge Between Continents, and an evening exploring Reykjavik where we will go to a local pizza restaurant for dinner.
- **Day 2:** Visits to the Secret Lagoon, Gullfoss Waterfall, Geysir Geothermal Area, Thingvellir National Park, and Kerid Crater.
- **Day 3:** Stops at the Lava Centre, Skogafoss Waterfall, Reynisfjara Beach, Vik, Sólheimajökull Glacier, and Seljalandsfoss Waterfall.
- **Day 4:** Return journey to Stansted Airport.

Last Thursday, Ursuline Academy had the privilege of hosting six postgraduate students from King's College London's Education, Policy, and Society programme as part of their volunteer visit day. The event, organised in collaboration with King's College London Alumni, brought an inspiring mix of stories and experiences to our Year 12 and Year 13 students.

The visiting students—Julia, Ashita, Yilin, Till, Manuela, and Ellen—shared their personal journeys, highlighting how life paths are rarely linear. Coming from diverse fields such as renewable energy, performing arts, teaching, and policy research, and hailing from countries as far afield as Spain, India, Colombia, China, the United States, and the UK, they captivated our sixth formers with their talks on motivation, embracing cultural differences, and finding purpose.

Reflecting on their experience, the MA students said, *"It was such a pleasure to come! Seeing their excited faces lighting up with our stories was a priceless moment. We also learnt so much and left so moved and fulfilled! We look forward to more future opportunities like this!"*

The event also left a lasting impression on our students. 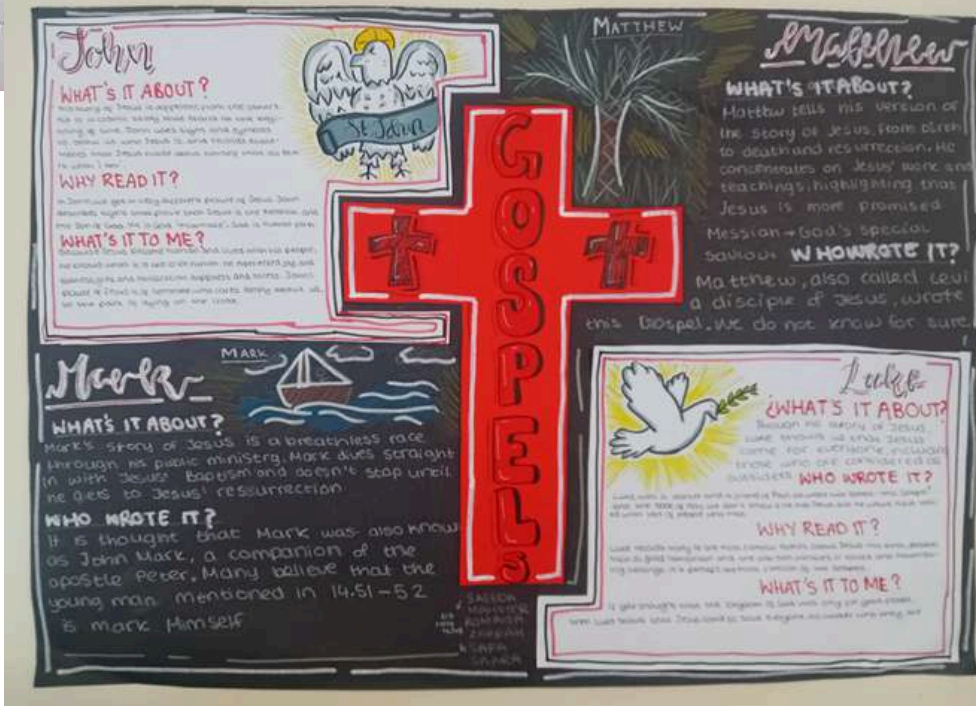
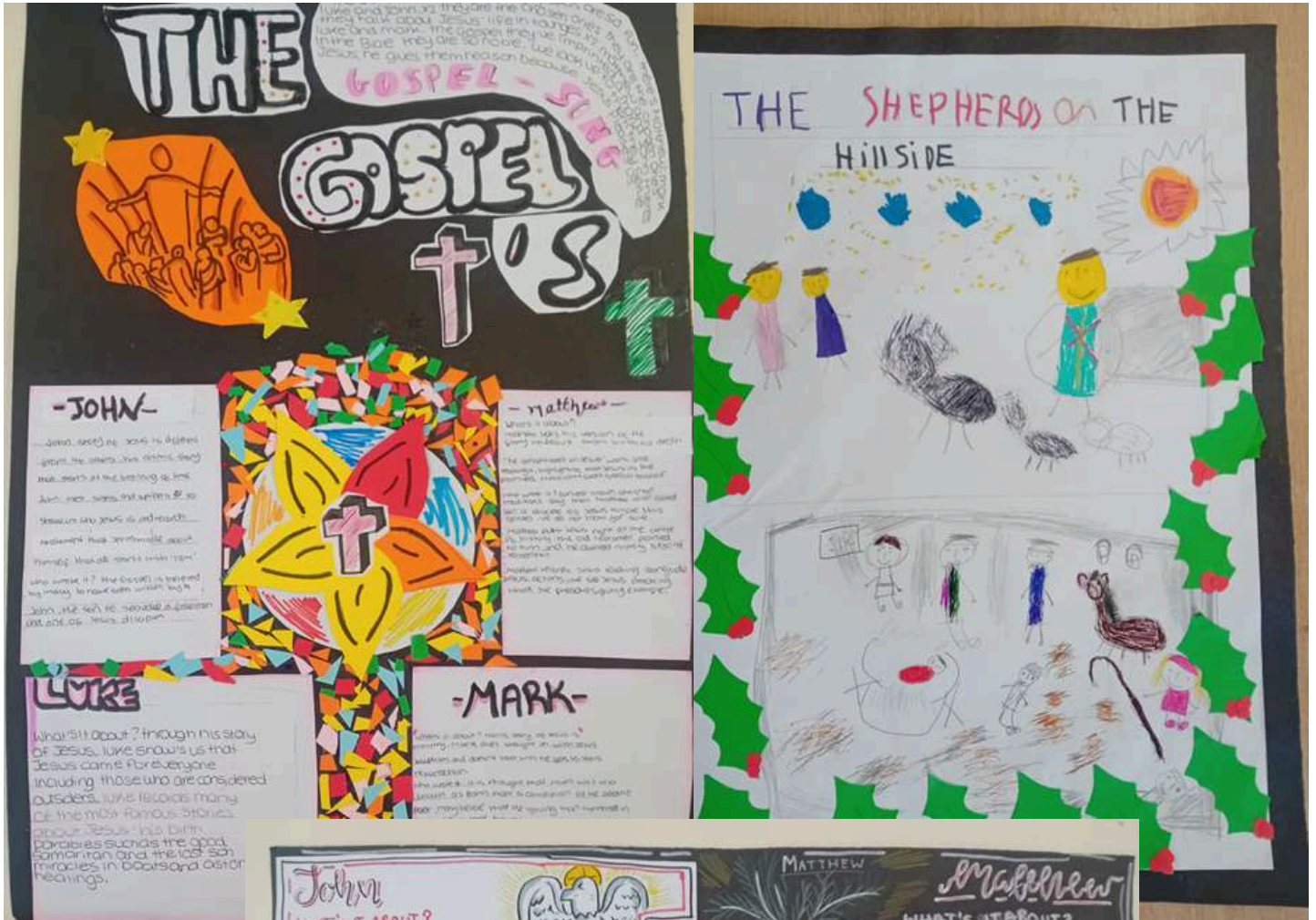
PE Stars of the Week

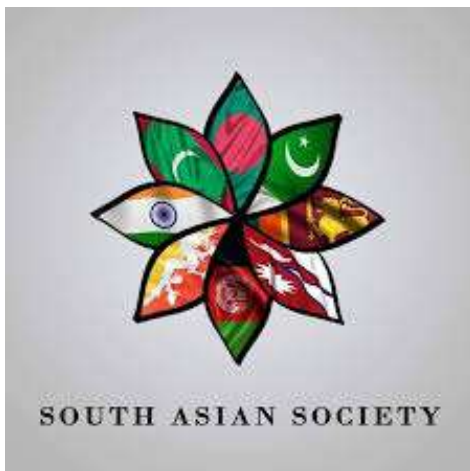




South Asian Society News

Did you know...just registering your daughter for Free School Meals means that our school gets extra money!!

You can register your daughter for Free School Meals if you receive any of these benefits:

- Universal Credit (provided you have an annual net earned income of no more than £7,400, as assessed by earnings from up to three of your most recent assessment periods)
 - Income Support
 - Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance
 - Income-related Employment and Support Allowance
 - Support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
 - The guaranteed element of Pension Credit
- Child Tax Credit (provided you're not also entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual gross income of no more than £16,190)
- Working Tax Credit run-on – paid for four weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit

If you want your daughter to have a free, healthy meal at lunchtime that's great – she will get a free meal (saving you more than £400 per year!). There is NO stigma attached and no one will know because we operate a cashless payment system in our Dining Hall.

If you qualify but don't want your daughter to have Free School Meals, please still register as the school will get additional funding. Your daughter can still continue to have her packed lunch as normal!

To apply please complete the on-line Free School Meals application on the Redbridge.gov.uk website. You can apply regardless of which borough you live in because your daughter attends a school in Redbridge. It is a simple 1-page form, so don't delay, apply today!!

It is important to note that:

- Taking the meal is recommended but not compulsory
- Your daughter may receive additional help as a result of being registered, for example, help with the cost of music lessons or school trips
- No one will know and it will not affect any other benefits you are claiming
- Registering your daughter for Free School Meals will bring in more money to our school.
