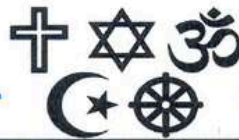
During August, the 8th Month of the year we celebrate the joy of Summer. The month is named after the Roman Emperor; Augustus Caesar



August days of Religious Significance

Obon: Buddhism: Tuesday, 13 to Thursday, 15 August The Festival honours the dead and the spirits of their ancestors across a three-day celebration.

Raksha Bandhan: Hinduism: Monday, 19 August This festival is dedicated to the god Krishna and celebrates the bond between siblings



There are a number of saints whose feast days are celebrated in August.

August 4: St. John Vianney, patron of parish priests.

August 11: Clare of Assisi, is an Italian saint who was one of the first followers of Francis of Assisi.

August 14: St. Maximilian Kolbe was a Polish Franciscan friar, priest, and martyr who lived from 1894 to 1941. He is known for his selfless act of volunteering to die in place of a stranger at the Auschwitz concentration camp during World War II.

August 28: St. Augustine of Hippo, a highly influential Christian theologian and philosopher, who lived from 354 to 430 AD.

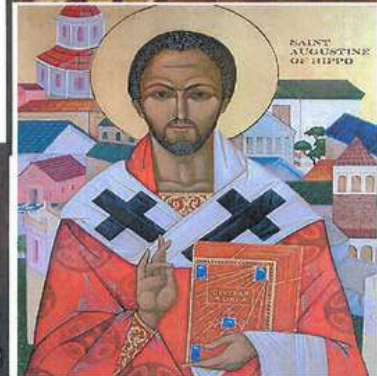
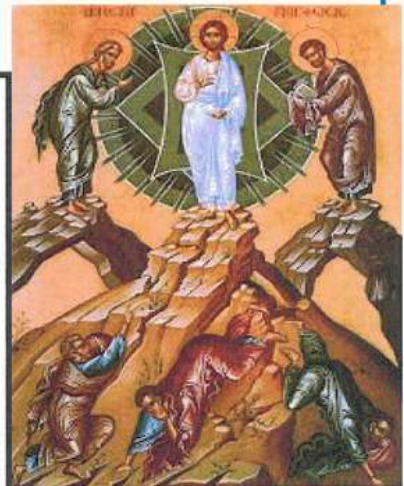

August 6: The Transfiguration.

The Transfiguration is a pivotal event in Christian tradition where Jesus's physical appearance was temporarily changed to reveal his divine glory. It is described in the Gospels as Jesus being transfigured on a mountain in the presence of his disciples Peter, James, and John, with his face shining like the sun and his clothes becoming dazzling white. The Old Testament figures Moses and Elijah appear and speak with Jesus, symbolizing the Law and the Prophets, respectively. A voice from a bright cloud proclaims, "This is my Son, whom I love; with him I am well pleased. Listen to him!"

The disciples are filled with awe and fear, with Peter suggesting they build shelters for Jesus, Moses, and Elijah. The Transfiguration is understood as a revelation of Jesus's divine nature and his connection to the Law and the Prophets. It also serves as a preview of his future glory. Many Christian denominations commemorate the event with the Feast of the Transfiguration, typically celebrated on August 6th.

NASA Trip

UAI's NASA TRIP 2025

What began in the school courtyard became a once-in-a-lifetime journey. We gathered together to wave goodbye, snap a group photo, and send our students off with excitement in the air and pride in our hearts. A trip made possible by dedicated staff, enthusiastic students, and a shared belief in the power of real-world learning.



Taking Off:

Our journey started on a high note—literally. The flight itself was excellent, but what made it unforgettable was **Amelia's experience stepping into the role of a Virgin Atlantic flight attendant**. Wearing the iconic Vivienne Westwood-designed uniform, she confidently completed the final in-flight service across all cabins, from First Class to Economy. Under expert guidance, she saw what it takes to work at 30,000 feet.

This incredible moment was more than just fun—it was a glimpse into a global career pathway. Talk about careers in the sky!



Day 1: STEM at Universal Studios – Where Learning Meets Thrill

Our first full day in Florida brought **science and adrenaline together** at Universal Studios. Students got to experience the science behind the scenes of a major theme park.

Exclusive early access to rides like **Amazing Adventures of Spider-Man** gave students a rare look into how physics and engineering power immersive experiences.

Students saw how motion simulators work, how Newton's Laws are applied, and even how polarisation is used in 3D effects.

The **Incredible Hulk Coaster** wowed everyone by demonstrating acceleration and g-forces, launching from 0 to 40mph in two seconds using 230 electric motors.

Rides like **Transformers** and **Reign of Kong** revealed the power of programming, lighting design, and mechanical engineering.

It was STEM at its most thrilling, blending classroom learning with real-world application and unforgettable fun.



Day 2: 🚀 NASA Kennedy Space Centre



The heart of the trip—and the spark behind it all—was our visit to NASA. This wasn't just a school trip. It was a **launchpad for imagination and ambition.**

We toured:

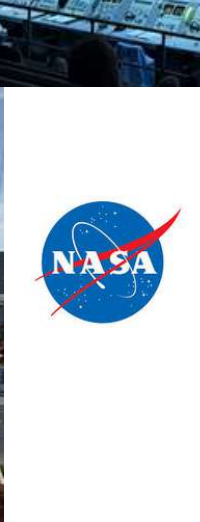
- The **Vehicle Assembly Building**, where rockets are prepared for space.
- **Historic launch pads**, including **SpaceX's cutting-edge site.**
- The **Space Shuttle Atlantis exhibit**, where students stood in awe of a real orbiter.
- **A simulation at the Mission Control Center**, showing what it takes to launch a spacecraft.

A standout moment was watching **JFK's "We choose to go to the Moon" speech**, prompting real conversations about the value of space exploration and the perseverance it demands.

🌌 **And then came the magic:** We woke up at midnight to witness a **live SpaceX rocket launch**, a rare experience that left everyone speechless as it lit up the sky.

Day 3: Exploring Florida – Culture, Leisure & Local Life

To give our students a broader experience of life in Florida, Day 3 was about exploring and unwinding:

- A visit to **Publix supermarket** introduced students to American retail culture.
- **A stroll along Cocoa Beach** (no swimming, just waves and wonder!) and a stop at **Ron Jon Surf Shop** – the largest in the world.
- **Shopping at Orlando Premium Outlets**, giving students the chance to relax and explore.
- **Dinner at Icon Park**, where rides, Mexican cuisine, and leisure time made for a perfect evening.

This day balanced culture and relaxation—a moment to connect with friends and soak in the Florida vibe.





Day 4: The Magic of Disney

A day at Disney's Magic Kingdom brought imagination to life—and taught students about physics in motion:

- Rides like **TRON**, **Space Mountain**, and the **Tiana Bayou Adventure** showed the impact of design, speed, and 3D tech.
- **Florida weather gave us a surprise rainstorm**—a chance to reflect on rapid climate changes.
- **Fireworks and a light show** in the evening brought the group together in a truly magical moment of unity.

It was more than a theme park visit—it was truly magical for our students.

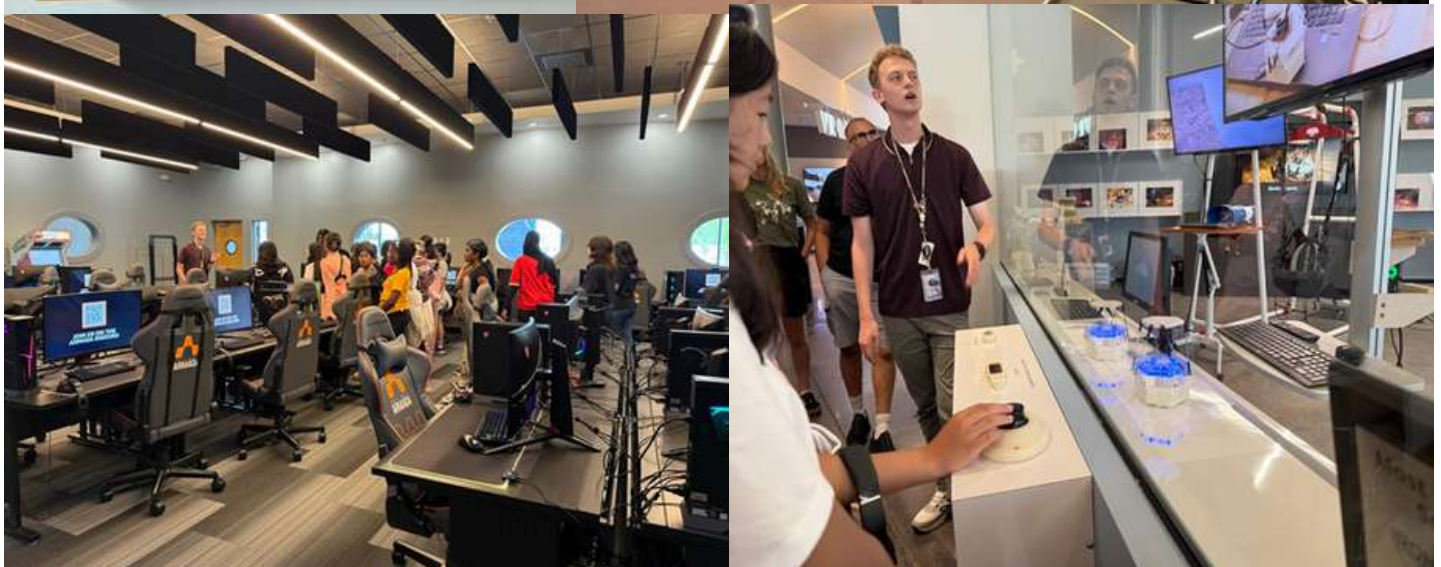


Day 5: Future of Tech at Full Sail University

Our final day took us into the future—literally. At Full Sail University, renowned for media, special effects, and gaming, we were immersed in the cutting-edge world of creative technology.

- We explored the **Hall of Fame**, showcasing the university's role in iconic films like *Star Wars*, *Top Gun*, and *Oppenheimer*.
- A tour through **film, animation, and gaming studios** showed students where imagination meets engineering.
- We learned how the university is supporting **medical innovation**, helping nurses perform procedures using mixed reality.
- **Full Sail is also the** creative engine behind Universal Studios' effects, showing the seamless blend of STEM and the arts.

It was an incredible showcase of **STEAM** – where science, technology, engineering, arts, and maths come together.

Uniform Reminders

Whilst I am sure that we are all currently focused on the summer holidays and September feels a long way off, we know that many of you will purchase school clothing for the new academic year during the summer break. We, therefore, wanted to communicate as clearly as possible, what the uniform requirements are to avoid students arriving to school in September with incorrect items.

Firstly, a reminder that students are allowed 1 gold or silver stud in the lobe of each ear. Please ensure that your daughter does not have any further piercings done over the summer that cannot be removed in time for the start of school.

Secondly, hair must be natural colours when students return to school in September.

Finally, all students are expected to wear black school shoes. These should have a flat heel and be leather or leather look. Trainers of any kind are not permitted. Below you will see examples of footwear that are and are not allowed. Please take careful note of this information as these rules will be strictly enforced in September. Below you will also see the general school uniform rules. Please note that if your daughter chooses to wear trousers, they must be Ursuline branded ones available from Lucilla's.

What are the uniform items you must wear?



- School blazer with SERVIAM badge pinned to the lapel
 - White shirt/blouse
 - School V-neck sweater or cardigan
 - Blue school skirt – worn to the knee or UAI School trousers
 - White or Navy knee length socks or black or navy tights
 - Black, flat-heeled school shoes [leather or leather appearance].
 - Head coverings must be blue or black
 - Cloth coats [no real or imitation leather] must be plain black or blue and *longer* than the blazer
 - Hair must be 'natural' colours only
- Optional:** two plain studs worn in the lobe of each ear, a small religious symbol on a thin plain chain, a watch.

- Additional jewellery or smart watches
- Hair accessories must be black, blue or clear only
- Nail polish or nail extensions
- Make-up
- False eye lashes or eyelash extensions
- 'Hoodies'
- Leggings
- Socks over tights
- Sweaters must be worn correctly and not tied at the back

Dear Parent/Carer,

I am writing to remind families that, if you are eligible, applying for Free School Meals (FSM) can bring real advantages—not only for your child, but for the whole school community. Every successful application brings additional funding to the school through the Government's Pupil Premium, which allows us to provide more targeted support, resources, and opportunities for all our students.

I want to reassure you that our cashless fingerprint system ensures complete privacy—no student or staff member is aware of who is or isn't receiving Free School Meals. Your child's experience in the canteen will be exactly the same as everyone else's.

Even if your child prefers a packed lunch or doesn't use the meal allowance every day, registering still benefits the school. The funding we receive helps support learning, wellbeing, enrichment, and extracurricular activities across the school.

If you're unsure whether you qualify, I encourage you to check—it only takes a few minutes and could make a meaningful difference. The application process is simple and confidential.

Did you know...just registering your daughter for Free School Meals means that our school gets extra money!!

You can register your daughter for Free School Meals if you receive any of these benefits:

- Universal Credit (provided you have an annual net earned income of no more than £7,400, as assessed by earnings from up to three of your most recent assessment periods)
 - Income Support
 - Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance
 - Income-related Employment and Support Allowance
 - Support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
 - The guaranteed element of Pension Credit
- Child Tax Credit (provided you're not also entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual gross income of no more than £16,190)
- Working Tax Credit run-on – paid for four weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit

If you want your daughter to have a free, healthy meal at lunchtime that's great – she will get a free meal (saving you more than £400 per year!). There is NO stigma attached and no one will know because we operate a cashless payment system in our Dining Hall.

If you qualify but don't want your daughter to have Free School Meals, please still register as the school will get additional funding. Your daughter can still continue to have her packed lunch as normal!

To apply please complete the on-line Free School Meals application on the Redbridge.gov.uk website. You can apply regardless of which borough you live in because your daughter attends a school in Redbridge. It is a simple 1-page form, so don't delay, apply today!!

It is important to note that:

- Taking the meal is recommended but not compulsory
- Your daughter may receive additional help as a result of being registered, for example, help with the cost of music lessons or school trips
- No one will know and it will not affect any other benefits you are claiming
- Registering your daughter for Free School Meals will bring in more money to our school.

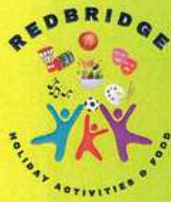

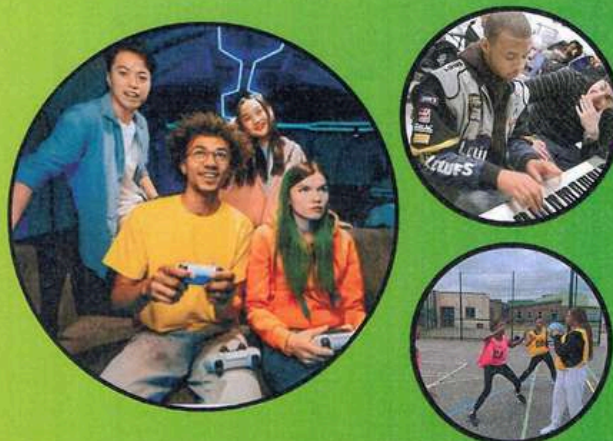
