


International Women in Engineering Day 23rd June 2023

As part of the International Women in Engineering Day 2023 (INWED23), we were delighted to be invited on Friday 23rd June to share in the celebrations of the day at the Science Museum. 18 of our students had the incredible opportunity to attend a sneak preview premiere screening of the pilot episode of 'The Inspire Series'. The series is aimed at showcasing the professional lives and journeys of remarkable women working in Science.

As we made our way to the Science Museum after an early start, an appreciated welcome of refreshments awaited us in time for the screening. During the morning, students not only had the chance to witness the unveiling of the new Inspire series but also had the privilege to meet renowned individuals such as Yewande Akinola MBE FIET, Dr Nike Folayan MBE PhD CEng FIET, and Dr A-Marie Imafidon MBE & Co-founder of Stemettes who joined via video link.



The first series presented the professional and social lives of four remarkable women engineers and proved to be truly uplifting, inspiring and igniting the passion in our girls to pursue STEM related careers.

We firmly believe that addressing the gender disparity and breaking down barriers in the field is essential and this event served as an exceptional way to encourage young girls to explore the exciting world of STEM. We are incredibly grateful for the support and enthusiasm showed by

was the Q&A and how we had the opportunity to ask questions and receive advice by the experienced engineers.


Young V&A Press and Influencer Preview

"Move Over, stuffed teddies, museums today need more to stimulate young minds, and it's critical we work to support and develop the next creative generation." Says the Tristram Hunt the director of the **Young V&A Museum** formerly the V&A Museum of Childhood. That's exactly what our visit for 30 students did on Monday for its first press preview. With its £30 million transformation, the students were the first to visit the museum since it closed 3 years ago.

Over the past two years, KS3 students and staff have worked very closely with the V&A (a valued partnership) in testing and piloting their new schools programme, ready to roll out to visiting school groups from September 2023. Students also took part in the World's first ever student co-curating with the designer **Sam Hecht** and they got an opportunity to see the 'Less than a Fiver' exhibition of the objects they had chosen displayed at the museum.



During our visit, students had a drawing session with the famous author and illustrator Ed Vere and were also interviewed about their experience in taking part in the redevelopment of the museum by various TV news channels including BBC London News, Sky FYI and journalists from other press houses including The Guardian and the children's newspaper First News. We would like to say Thank you to Kirsty Sullivan, Julia Josephson, Catherine Ritman Smith and all the Young V&A team for their work with our students, having our young people in attendance at this very special event and for allowing them to fully experience the museum first-hand. 

Are you entitled? Did you know...just registering your daughter for Free School Meals means that our school gets extra money!!

You can register your daughter for Free School Meals if you receive any of these benefits:

- Income Support
- Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance
- Income-related Employment and Support Allowance
- Support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- The guaranteed element of Pension Credit

- Child Tax Credit (provided you're not also entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual gross income of no more than £16,190)
- Working Tax Credit run-on paid for four weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit
- Universal Credit if you apply on or after 1 April 2018 your household income must be less that £7,400 a year (after tax and not including any benefits you get)

Children who get paid these benefits directly, instead of through a parent or guardian, can also get Free School Meals.

If you want your daughter to have a free, healthy meal at lunchtime that's great – she will get a free meal (saving you more than £400 per year!). There is NO stigma attached and no one will know because we operate a cashless payment system in our Dining Hall.

If you qualify but don't want your daughter to have Free School Meals, please still register as the school will get additional funding. Your daughter can still continue to have her packed lunch as normal!

To apply please complete the on-line Free School Meals application on the Redbridge.gov.uk website. You can apply regardless of which borough you live in because your daughter attends a school in Redbridge. It is a simple 1-page form, so don't delay, apply today!!

It is important to note that:

- Taking the meal is recommended but not compulsory
- Your daughter may receive additional help as a result of being registered, for example, help with the cost of music lessons or school trips
- No one will know and it will not affect any other benefits you are claiming
- Registering your daughter for Free School Meals will bring in more money to our school.

Re. Message from your Safer Schools Officers: Talk to your child about phone safety

Mobile phones are a great way to stay in contact with family and friends. Most Secondary School aged children now own one or have access to one.

As useful as they are, they can make children vulnerable to thieves who are particularly interested in new models and other valuable items such as cash, airpods and expensive coats. Reducing robbery is our top priority and our officers are working hard to catch those responsible, with activity to prevent it taking place daily.

There are however, a number of things you can do to help reduce your child's risk of becoming a victim and keep safe whilst using their phone. **If you can, talk to them about where and how they use their phone using the following advice**:

Safety when out and about:

- Keep your phone and valuables out of sight in a safe place when travelling to and from school. Be careful when you take your phone out in public places.
- Bus stops, train stations and surrounding areas are common target areas for thieves, who can approach on foot, moped or on a pedal bike or e-scooter.
- Earphones/headphones can distract you, stopping you from seeing or hearing someone approach you from behind.
- Don't confront a thief it's not worth risking your own safety for possessions that can be replaced.
- Robbery or attempted robbery are serious crimes and should be reported. It's important you *seek help straight away by dialing 999* rather than contacting police when you get home or at school the following day. Use a friend's phone or the phone of a trusted adult. This gives us the best chance to catch the suspects, recover any stolen property and ensure your safety.
- If you have information about a robbery and do not want to report it to police, speak to Fearless 100 % anonymously at <u>www.fearless.org</u>. Fearless is the youth service of independent charity Crimestoppers.
- Whether you have a phone or not, memorise or keep a parent/carer's phone number in a separate place in your bag/zipped pocket in case of emergency.

Help protect your child's phone if it's stolen:

- Use your device's security features, apps or PIN locking mechanisms to protect your data and prevent the phone being used.
- Keep a record of the phone's IMEI number (not on your phone!). This is a 15-digit unique number which can be obtained by keying in *#06#. You need this information if the phone is lost or stolen.
- Consider installing a tracker app, available online.

Robbery is when force is used or threatened to steal items. Thieves often target people who are distracted, so keeping your valuables including your mobile phone and other devices hidden ensures you're more alert.

HOW CAN I STAY SAFE?

- When out and about be aware of your surroundings.
- Stay alert when walking along the road for criminals who might use bikes/mopeds or e-scooters to snatch phones/valuables.
- Try not to walk along with your phone or valuables on show.
- Earbuds/Headphones can be a distraction.
- Plan your route and use forms of transport that others are using and avoid shortcuts in isolated places.

IF YOU ARE A VICTIM

Crime prevention advice can help reduce your chances of being robbed, but it may still happen to you. It can be a frightening experience and leave you feeling worried afterwards, especially if you felt threatened or violence was used. Talking to a parent or adult you trust can help.



IF YOU SEE A ROBBERY TAKING PLACE ...

Thieves may use force or threatening behaviour. It's better to hand items over than risk your own safety.

If you see a robbery or one has just taken place call police on 999. You can still report later on 101 or online.





KEEPING YOU And Your Phone Safe

Getting a phone is really exciting. You can stay in touch with friends and find out more about the world. As police officers, our job is to keep you safe and stop people who want to steal property like phones, cash, earphones and even expensive coats or trainers.

You can help us do that by being careful where you use your phone and taking care of cash and other valuable items.

5 TIPS TO KEEP SAFE

- Keep your phone and valuables out of sight and in a safe place. Take care when you take them out especially near bus stops and train stations.
- Stay alert and remember earphones/headphones can distract you from being aware of someone approaching from behind you. Thieves can approach on mopeds, e-scooters and pedal cycles.

Don't fight back, it's not worth the risk when a phone can be replaced.

Tell us if someone robs you or tries to. It's important you get help straight away by dialling 999 using a friend or trusted adult's phone rather than contacting police when you get home. This gives us the best chance to catch the suspects, recover stolen items and make sure you're safe.

- If you don't want to talk to police – contact Fearless online, without giving your name, at www.fearless.org
- Memorise or keep a note of a parent/carer's phone number in a separate place in case of emergency.

YOU CAN HELP US PROTECT AND TRACK YOUR PHONE IF IT'S STOLEN.

HERE'S 3 THINGS YOU CAN DO:

- Your phone will have security features such as a passcode or fingerprint/ face ID. Make sure you use it to protect access to your phone.
- Tracker apps can help locate your phone if it's lost or stolen. Ask a parent to show you how to set one up.
- Record the phone's IMEI number in a separate place at home. Find this by typing in *#06#. You'll need to give this number to police if it's stolen.





Selfless people make the world a much better place.

Ask your child what the word 'selfless' means to them. Being 'selfless' is the opposite of being 'selfish'. It is about being very aware of others' needs or interests, and putting them before our own. Who are the most selfless people that your child knows - that is, people who put others' needs first? Why did they think of those people? It may help your child if you can talk about a historical figure or someone you know who can be described as selfless. What is it like to be in the company of a selfless person?

To love God, we must be selfless. As a family, talk about how you can selflessly follow Jesus and serve others in this coming week, even in little ways, at home, at school or in the community.
