Wintershall Retreat

Next year the Ursuline sisters celebrate 100 years of being a part of the Roman Union. All of our schools have been organising different ways of celebrating together and last week Wimbledon Prep School organised a retreat for Year 7 at Wintershall Estate.

During our trip we got to experience different activities. We began at a lake where a volunteer actress performed and described the point of view of Peter's mother in law and how Jesus chose fishermen to be disciples because they already had the qualities needed for it. Afterwards we were given a small wooden fish that was supposed to have a different meaning for all of us.





For me it represented how the simplest of people could be chosen for great things which means even I could be chosen too. Next, we went to visit some donkeys which were my personal favourite and we learnt about how kings would ride horses as well as knights and other upperclassmen however even though Jesus was a king, his story often involves a donkey. For example, the birth of Jesus involved Mary riding a donkey whilst looking for somewhere to stay and Jesus fulfils a prophecy involving him sitting on a donkey. We even got to pet and feed the donkeys in the activity. The token we received was a small wooden donkey which reminded me of the humility and openness of the donkeys.

Following that we visited the sheep and got to pet them. We talked about the relevance of sheep in the

stories of Jesus, primarily how during the birth of Jesus, Angels came to shepherds to encourage them to go and see the son of God which once again shows how simplicity can lead to the greatest of things. From the sheep we ended up with a real tuft of wool which to me was a reminder of how simple things can have great meanings. And thinking of Jesus as the lamb of God and in reality, the most important thing is faith in God. Lastly, we went on a nature walk to the stations of the cross. Each was ornate and beautiful but my favourite was the tomb of Christ represented by intertwining tree roots. It really showed the beauty and love in the sacrifice of Jesus. From this final activity we received a cross which I think is a wonderful way to remember the entire experience of the day.



This whole experience was a deeper dive in to what it means to be a Christian as someone who isn't of that faith. As a Hindu, I think that in my faith we also believe that a simple life is one of the best ways to live and that love and compassion are some of the main qualities that should be in a person. *Vaishalli*

can meet them again soon.




Community Grocery Ilford



Geography News

Increase in Music Tuition Fees – starting September 2023

Please be aware that there will be an increase in the fees for music tuition at The Ursuline Academy Ilford starting from September 2023. The Musician's Union has recommended new rates and so we have adjusted our fees accordingly. The increased fees will help us maintain the high standard of teaching and resources necessary for your daughter's musical growth.

The new fees for music tuition starting from September 2023 will be as follows:

- Individual lessons: £12 per 20-minute lesson / £18 per 30-minute lesson;
- Shared lessons (2 students): £6 per 20-minute lesson

We understand the importance of financial accessibility, and we will continue to offer bursaries to students who receive Free School Meals. Science News

Weekly Science Club: Piercing a plastic bag with pencils

This week we looked at the properties of water and plastic to help us pierce holes through a plastic bag. No water spilled out of the holes as the bags are made of a polymer. Polymers have a long chain of molecules that are flexible. When we poked the sharp pencils through the polymer it slid between the chain of molecules and made a seal around the hole.

Water consists of molecules that attract to each other strongly and creates surface tension where the water droplets hold together and at the surface forms a barrier that requires some force to break it.

As the pencils were very sharp this occurred smoothly enough to cause no leaks as we can see some groups successfully used numerous pencils.



Are you entitled? Did you know...just registering your daughter for Free School Meals means that our school gets extra money!!

You can register your daughter for Free School Meals if you receive any of these benefits:

- Income Support
- Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance
- Income-related Employment and Support Allowance
- Support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- The guaranteed element of Pension Credit
- Child Tax Credit (provided you're not also entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual gross income of no more than £16,190)
- Working Tax Credit run-on paid for four weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit
- Universal Credit if you apply on or after 1 April 2018 your household income must be less that £7,400 a year (after tax and not including any benefits you get)

Children who get paid these benefits directly, instead of through a parent or guardian, can also get Free School Meals.

If you want your daughter to have a free, healthy meal at lunchtime that's great – she will get a free meal (saving you more than £400 per year!). There is NO stigma attached and no one will know because we operate a cashless payment system in our Dining Hall.

If you qualify but don't want your daughter to have Free School Meals, please still register as the school will get additional funding. Your daughter can still continue to have her packed lunch as normal!

To apply please complete the on-line Free School Meals application on the Redbridge.gov.uk website. You can apply regardless of which borough you live in because your daughter attends a school in Redbridge. It is a simple 1-page form, so don't delay, apply today!!

It is important to note that:

- Taking the meal is recommended but not compulsory
- Your daughter may receive additional help as a result of being registered, for example, help with the cost of music lessons or school trips
- No one will know and it will not affect any other benefits you are claiming
- Registering your daughter for Free School Meals will bring in more money to our school.

We know that many households are feeling the financial impact of the escalating cost of living and many are now having to make a tough decision between heating and eating. In response to this, we're launching a new community grocery in Ilford that will keep families fed and allow people to access support too.

We provide a great selection of healthy branded items that you'd expect to find at your local supermarket but for a fraction of the price. We're run on a membership basis designed to help anyone who needs to bring down the cost of their food shop by offering a full selection of groceries for just £4 per shop. We've even price matched a few of our standard shops against high street supermarkets and found that our members can save on average £20 each visit.

We know choosing the items you like for your family is really important and so we have thousands of products to select from each week with new lines added each day.

Our members not only get to save on their food shop but they also get to play their part in helping to protect the environment. Lots of the items in our grocery have been given to us by local supermarkets and would have normally ended up going into landfill. The food is all great, and there are many reasons why supermarkets have surplus food to donate. It may be there are packaging mistakes, errors with ordering or that the food that ends up too close to its 'best before' date for them to sell. So they've given it to the Community Grocery.

As we are reliant on what supermarkets donate to us we can't guarantee what items we'll have in stock for you on each visit, so you may find that you need to do a top up shop during the week for any key items you're missing. We receive new collections every day and so to be the first to see what goodies we have in stock, make sure you follow your local Community Grocery Facebook or Instagram pages.

And there's more. All of our members will be able to access loads of other benefits like job clubs, money management courses, mental well-being courses, youth clubs, volunteering and much more.

How it works

- To become a member, just visit our grocery any time whilst we're open (Monday Friday 9.30am - 4.30pm) and we'll get you signed up straight away and then walk you through your first shop. It's £5 for 1 years membership and you can visit our grocery two times a week.
- A standard shop in the grocery is £4 and includes 12 items from our bakery, fruit and veg, shelf items, non-food, fridge and freezer sections. A normal £4 shop will typically fill 2-3 shopping bags. We also have little extra items you can get on top of your shop and include items like fresh milk, meat, cheese and eggs.
- 3. All of our Community Groceries will also be running a variety of free courses and events to get to know our members better and help support them with any specific needs. Once these go live, you can sign up for them in the grocery.


Everywhere I go I can spread either gossip or peace, either hurt or God's healing - the healing which Jesus brought as he went round the countryside.

THE GOSPEL IN CHURCH Sunday 18th June 2023



When Jesus saw the crowds he felt sorry for them because they were harassed and dejected, like sheep without a shepherd. He said to his twelve disciples, "The harvest is rich but the labourers are few, so ask the Lord of the harvest to send labourers

to his harvest." He then gave them authority over unclean spirits with power to cast them out and to cure all kinds of diseases and sickness. These are the names of the twelve apostles: first, Simon who is called Peter, and his brother Andrew; James the, son of Zebedee, and his brother John; Philip and Bartholomew; Thomas, and Matthew the tax collector; James the son of Alphaeus, and Thaddaeus; Simon the Zealot and Judas Iscariot, the one who was to betray him. These twelve Jesus sent out, instructing them as follows: "Go to the lost sheep of the House of Israel. And as you go, proclaim that the kingdom of heaven is close at hand. Cure the sick, raise the dead, cleanse the lepers, cast out devils. You received without charge, give without charge."
