## UAI celebrates International Women's Day!

This Wednesday 8<sup>th</sup> March UAI once again celebrated International Women's Day, now a well-established and important day in our school calendar.

Throughout the week Ms Stone led our whole school assemblies with a focus on the importance of International Women's Day and how honouring the relevance of the movement has implications for our own students as they begin to consider their ambitions and what they would like their futures to look like.

On the day itself students and staff were all invited to wear purple in honour of the feminist movement, and each were given a feminist sticker to wear with pride – it was wonderful to see so many of our community getting involved and sharing the messages of female empowerment they were proudly displaying! Throughout the day there were also a number of different activities taking place, including learning about a different inspirational woman at the start of each lesson, whom students will then vote on to decide upon our UAI Inspirational Woman of the Year, and a 'photobooth' where students and staff made their #EmbraceEquity pledges in line with this year's International Women's Day theme and a talk by Dr Ama Frimpong, the 2022 Young Woman Engineer of the Year, to the whole of Year 8.

Unfortunately, due to snow on the day we were unable to put our activism into action by chalking the courtyard with feminist slogans as we have done in previous years, but we will aim to reschedule this for another day once the weather has improved so stay tuned!

Once again it was wonderful to see so many of our school community get involved but, most importantly, to see our students, who are the women of tomorrow, demonstrating their own determination to ensure gender equity, both for themselves and other future women. Well done and keep up fight for equity!








#### International Women's Day (8<sup>th</sup> March): La journée de la Femme

NJIRC23 @ Copperbox, Stratford On Friday the 3rd of March a group of 27 girls competed in the National Junior Rowing Competition. This is a massive competition which includes the nation's best junior rowers all coming together to compete on indoor rowing machines. All the girls have attended Miss Keogh's club on a Monday lunchtime and have had a London Youth rowing coach coming in to help occasionally.

The races started with Year 12 and 13 students who had row 2000m, our two individual competitors *Isabel* and *Lois* finished 12th and 15th in the country - an amazing achievement!



Next were the Year 8's who had to row as far as they could in 3 minutes, *Gabriella* was our top rower finishing in 45th position out of almost 200 competitors. The sole Year 9 competitor had to row for 4 minutes and managed a best performance of 806 meters.

The relays were next. The first one was a boat race in teams of 8 (race the same time as the Oxford v Cambridge boat race takes on average). A mix of Year 10, 11 and 12/13 students made up our team and they finished 7th as a result of their fast changeovers (roll off the seat and land on a heap on the floor!) and words of encouragement given when fatigue started to set in.

Three teams of 4 competed in the sprint relays and again the girls all gelled as a unit finishing in 43rd, 52nd and 54th.


The final events were the Year 10's 5-minute row, top performer was **Ariba** rowing 1065m and the Year 11's 6-minute row, best performer was **Zahra** with 1323m.

The girls were a credit to the school with the majority of the girls getting best ever performances rowing further than ever before and their behaviour during the long day was impeccable.

## **Redbridge Foodbank**

On Tuesday 7th March, 6 of us and Cleo went down to the Redbridge food

bank in Jubilee Church where we volunteered for an hour and also handed in the donations that had been collected in the chapel. There, I packed bags of food that would be collected from the food bank by either a family of 4 or a single bag that would feed 2, the bags had things like cereal, biscuits and long-life milk etc. Objects such as toiletries were handed out differently, people would get a pack of toilet rolls each and then be able to choose from a list and would get one of what they needed. Others, were packing food in to boxes and measuring and dividing out things like washing liquid and oil into individual bottles and rice into bags. Overall the experience was insightful, the food bank had a good system in place and everything was very organised, the volunteers were welcoming and guided us on the jobs we needed to do.







Are you entitled? Did you know...just registering your daughter for Free School Meals means

#### that our school gets extra money!!

You can register your daughter for Free School Meals if you receive any of these benefits:

- Income Support
- Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance
- Income-related Employment and Support Allowance
- Support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- The guaranteed element of Pension Credit
- Child Tax Credit (provided you're not also entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual gross income of no more than £16,190)
- Working Tax Credit run-on paid for four weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit
- Universal Credit if you apply on or after 1 April 2018 your household income must be less that £7,400 a year (after tax and not including any benefits you get)

Children who get paid these benefits directly, instead of through a parent or guardian, can also get Free School Meals.

If you want your daughter to have a free, healthy meal at lunchtime that's great – she will get a free meal (saving you more than £400 per year!). There is NO stigma attached and no one will know because we operate a cashless payment system in our Dining Hall.

If you qualify but don't want your daughter to have Free School Meals, please still register as the school will get additional funding. Your daughter can still continue to have her packed lunch as normal!

To apply please complete the on-line Free School Meals application on the Redbridge.gov.uk website. You can apply regardless of which borough you live in because your daughter attends a school in Redbridge. It is a simple 1-page form, so don't delay, apply today!!

It is important to note that:

- Taking the meal is recommended but not compulsory
- Your daughter may receive additional help as a result of being registered, for example, help with the cost of music lessons or school trips
- No one will know and it will not affect any other benefits you are claiming
- Registering your daughter for Free School Meals will bring in more money to our school.

#### Dear Parents and Carers,


In this Sunday's Gospel we have a witty dialogue between Jesus and the Samaritan woman drawing water at the well, where each seems to be teasing the other.



Jesus came to the Samaritan town called Sychar and, tired by the journey, sat straight down at Jacob's well. A Samaritan woman came to draw water. Jesus said to her, "Give me a drink." She was taken by surprise because Jews and Samaritans rarely

spoke to each other. She replied, "What? You are a Jew and I am a Samaritan woman. How can you ask me for a drink of water when Jews and Samaritans don't have anything to do with each other?" Jesus replied: "If you only knew what God is offering and who it is that is saying to you: 'Give me a drink,' you would have been the one to ask, and he would have given you living water." "You have no bucket, sir," she answered, "and the well is deep: how could you get this living water?" Jesus replied: "Whoever drinks this water will get thirsty again; but anyone who drinks the water that I shall give will never be thirsty again: the water that I shall give will turn into a spring inside them, welling up to eternal life." "Sir," said the woman, "give me some of that water, so that I may never get thirsty again."



### 2 Wednesday's GOD'S LOVE 3 Loving God & Each Other Words are ...
