Dear Parents/Guardians

#### Headteacher's Headlines...

I want to update you on our efforts to improve the way students wear their uniform at school. We believe that a well-maintained and properly worn uniform promotes a sense of pride and belonging among our students, and sets a positive tone for learning.

We would like to remind you that all students must wear their uniform correctly at all times. This includes wearing the proper attire and accessories in the correct manner and colour as outlined in our school's uniform policy. The vast majority of our students do this and standards are very high at the Ursuline!



Over the next few weeks, we will be monitoring uniform compliance more closely and reminding our students of the rules and expectations for wearing their uniform correctly. We will also be reminding them of the consequences for not following the uniform policy. We are giving our students some time to really appreciate why they must wear their uniform correctly until half term and expect everyone to return to school on Tuesday 21st February with exemplary uniform.

We appreciate your cooperation in this matter and we believe that by working together we can ensure that all students are dressed in a way that is respectful and appropriate for the school environment. If you have any concerns about providing your daughter with the correct uniform please do contact us at enquiries@uai.org.uk

Next week I will publish updated details of what is expected and what is not allowed. Please do have conversations with your child about this at home.

In the Autumn term, I proposed to the Governors the option to introduce school trousers as an addition to the school uniform. After careful consideration, the Governors have agreed to adapt the uniform policy and, starting from September 2023, all pupils will have the option to wear trousers as part of their school uniform.

We are currently working with our uniform supplier to ensure that we have trousers available that complement our existing uniform and are cost-effective for families. The trousers will feature a specific design, reflective of our school. We will be updating you soon with more information on this. It's worth

noting that pupils will still have the option to wear skirts as part of their uniform if they choose, but it will be either/or and not both skirts and trousers together.

Additionally, we are also working with our uniform supplier to set up a recycling service for school uniforms. This service will allow parents to purchase previously-owned uniforms at a reduced rate. We will be updating you in the near future about this. In the meantime, we kindly ask parents to donate any "preloved" uniforms to the school, so we can support pupils who require additional items.

You will also see below on page 11 a copy of the letter I sent out to all parents yesterday regarding the upcoming strike action planned for 1<sup>st</sup> February, and the plans we have here in school. We do not like being closed for any pupils in the school but I do want to do what is best and manageable in the interests of the safety and wellbeing of all students and staff. Again, please do not hesitate to contact me if you have any concerns or enquiries.

And finally, we hosted a very successful 6<sup>th</sup> Form Open Evening last night, and we look forward to all attendees joining us in September! We had a draw for a £50 Amazon Voucher open to all who attended, and I am pleased to say the lucky winner was *Kathreena Royce* in 11T!

### **Holocaust Memorial Day**




Holocaust Memorial

of other people killed under Nazi persecution of other groups and during more recent genocides in Cambodia, Rwanda, Bosnia and Darfur.


#### The theme this year is 'Ordinary People'






Congratulations to *Fatima Hamayum* on completing her Nuffield research report and achieving a Gold Crest award.



Dear Parent/Carers

We have decided to implement a partial closure of our school on Wednesday 1st February.

During this time, we will be inviting Year 11 and a small number of identified pupils into school for inperson instruction, while the majority of students will be asked to stay at home. If your child is being invited to attend school you will receive a separate email from the school regarding this. Staff who are not taking part in the industrial action will set work for their classes on Satchel that day. Where students are not set work, they should take the opportunity to catch up on homework, revise or read a good book.

Many Year 11 pupils will have their one to one meeting for 6th form advice and guidance on Wednesday 1st February and there will also be time available for study sessions as well as many of their normal lessons going ahead.

We understand that this may cause some inconvenience, but we believe that this is the best course of action to ensure the safety and well-being of our students and staff. NEU members are taking this action to secure a fully-funded, above-inflation pay rise, as underfunding in education has severe implications for us all. I support all colleagues at the Ursuline in the decisions they have made regarding whether to take strike action or not. The NEU members and all staff are clear this is a dispute with the government and not headteachers.



During the work experience day, students will follow 2 patients from their initial presentation to recovery. They will gain a unique insight into how patients interact with a variety of healthcare professionals and what it's like to work in an NHS multidisciplinary team. This includes:

- Occupational Therapy
- Dietetics
- Radiography
- Prosthetics and Orthotics

### Did you know...just registering your daughter for Free School Meals means

#### that our school gets extra money!!

You can register your daughter for Free School Meals if you receive any of these benefits:

- Income Support
- Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance
- Income-related Employment and Support Allowance
- Support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- The guaranteed element of Pension Credit
- Child Tax Credit (provided you're not also entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual gross income of no more than £16,190)
- Working Tax Credit run-on paid for four weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit
- Universal Credit if you apply on or after 1 April 2018 your household income must be less that £7,400 a year (after tax and not including any benefits you get)

Children who get paid these benefits directly, instead of through a parent or guardian, can also get Free School Meals.

If you want your daughter to have a free, healthy meal at lunchtime that's great – she will get a free meal (saving you more than £400 per year!). There is NO stigma attached and no one will know because we operate a cashless payment system in our Dining Hall.

If you qualify but don't want your daughter to have Free School Meals, please still register as the school will get additional funding. Your daughter can still continue to have her packed lunch as normal!

To apply please complete the on-line Free School Meals application on the Redbridge.gov.uk website. You can apply regardless of which borough you live in because your daughter attends a school in Redbridge. It is a simple 1-page form, so don't delay, apply today!!

#### It is important to note that:

- Taking the meal is recommended but not compulsory
- Your daughter may receive additional help as a result of being registered, for example, help with the cost of music lessons or school trips
- No one will know and it will not affect any other benefits you are claiming
- Registering your daughter for Free School Meals will bring in more money to our school.

## THE GOSPEL IN CHURCH Sunday 29th January 2023



Seeing the crowds, Jesus went up the hill. There he sat down and was joined by his disciples. Then he began to speak. This is what he taught them: "How happy are the poor in spirit; theirs is the kingdom

of heaven. Happy the gentle: they shall have the earth for their heritage. Happy those who mourn: they shall be comforted. Happy those who hunger and thirst for what is right: they shall be satisfied. Happy the merciful: they shall have mercy shown them. Happy the pure in heart: they shall see God.
