Curriculum Deputy Headteacher's Headlines... Assessment

Assessment is a vital part of learning. The specific guidance each student receives throughout their school career greatly contributes to their academic success and the skills they develop as life-long learners.

How is assessment used to gather information about my child's learning?

Assessment is used regularly through teacher questioning, activities completed in lessons and homework. Students then receive feedback from their teachers in all lessons enabling them to understand precisely what they are doing successfully and what they should focus on to improve. This information is shared with them in oral and written feedback and students respond to it, demonstrating their improvement. This information is also used to ensure

lessons are adapted to meet the needs of each student and class.

What information will I get about my child's progress?

Years 7-10 will receive three reports and two reports for Years 11-13, with one report being the full Record of Achievement Report with detailed comment from each subject teacher for your child. In the autumn term, we will send you a Progress Report for your child.

In Years 7-9, this is reported for each subject your child studies as working 'beyond', 'at' or 'towards' an appropriate age level based on the information each teacher gathers in all lessons and homework throughout the autumn term. We will also report an Effort grade and a Behaviour grade for each subject. Currently, we are reviewing the KS3 assessment and working on updating our KS3 assessment procedures, so we will be asking for students/parents' feedback in next half term.

In Years 10 & 12, this is reported for each subject your child studies as their 'Current' grade for GCSE or A Level and in Years 11 & 13 as 'Expected' grade based on the information each teacher gathers in all lessons and homework throughout the autumn term. We will also report an Effort grade and a Behaviour grade for each subject.

In this half term students in Year 11 undertake a mock examination prior to the Christmas break and Year 13 mock examination at the start of spring term.

A DAY THAT REVEALED AMAZING LAYERS OF HISTORY

I was so excited to be invited to the construction site and it was so amazing and interesting it made me think of going into the industry especially seeing how there was a lack of diversity of gender and race because I want to empower girls to enter this amazing and adventurous field and remove the stereotype of a male dominated field as it is very skilled. Located in the heart of the City, with panoramic views over St Paul's Cathedral and beyond. The company Mace Group are transforming the former BT HQ into a Net Zero Carbon Office. Compared to a full demolition and rebuild, they are working with the existing structure which cuts the carbon footprint in half. I learnt about a building process called cut and crave which means a lot of the fabrication of the build are made offsite in a factory and then shipped to the site and placed onto the building. Achieving a carbon saving of 465kg CO2 per sq. metre and through adopting a circular Economy approach much of the material will be recycled.



The fascinating thing was that during the building process on the Friday before we arrived they had found human remains in what seems like a well which delayed the construction build. Delays like this can cost the company money however, they were very persistent, and we were able to speak to the archeologist about their find. Seeing the human remains were shocking at first and slightly mortifying as they were pre- medieval around the 15th century, although they said they had accounted for these types of scenario due to the history of the area, it was still unexpected. I had a really good experience and would like to thank Andy and Reece who both showed us around and for this wonderful rare opportunity. *Nahian Joyeta 10T*

This trip to the construction site was a great experience for me and made me keen in going to the familiar field in architecture. We learned about their ups and downs when doing the project as they had to face challenges through this event like finding out there used to be a grave yard during the 15th century, where we saw at least 160 bodies underneath the building by the archaeologists. This was shocking but fascinating on how we had seen history under this building in central London. I also found out their sustainable methods they use during the construction, which is 'cut and carve' showing how they kept few main parts from the old building and developed it maintaining the things which are being removed from the building. *Veda Ramineedi* **107**

During my MACE trip I loved how exciting the archaeologist uncovered skeletons. This fascinated me because as they slowly uncovered them it showed something that looked like a well and it made me wonder

what might be there. I loved how they were going to use old elements from the previous building and how sustainable it will eventually become. Thank You for this life time experience. *Zahra Mujtab 10T*

Hamayun in Year 13 attended a celebration event at the Education Policy Institute in London for students who had completed the Nuffield Research Programme. The NRP programme provides engaging, hands-on research projects, where Year 12 students have the opportunity to make a meaningful contribution towards the work of a host organisation through a well-supervised but independent research collaboration relating to an area of science, quantitative social science, computing, technology, engineering or maths (or a combination!). Fatimah carried out her research on learning outcomes of young children with English as an additional language and Nereannah on Undergraduate tutoring programmes.

Nereannah had the following to say:

I had the privilege of being accepted to the Nuffield Research placements during the summer. The aim of my project was to review undergraduate tutoring programmes in UK universities to inform the creation of the national tutoring service. I was able to meet with professors and labour policy makers to discuss the importance of a national tutoring service. This week I attended the celebration event at Imperial College London. During this event I was able to present my research and the current application and relevance of my work. There were many inspiring speakers and I really enjoyed it.

Fatimah had the following to say:

The Nuffield research placement was an insightful and exciting experience. I was able to enhance my skills, but also, this programme also gave me the opportunity to build up new skills. My internship was with the Education Policy Institute, I had worked with Dr Kerris Cooper during my internship to produce my project. My research paper focused on the learning outcomes of young children with English as an additional language. I had learnt a lot from this experience over the summer and am very grateful to have been selected for this programme. I certainly recommend this to our new Year 12's and hope they also gain this lovely opportunity.

Some of the Sadducees - those who say that there is no resurrection approached Jesus and they asked him what he thought marriage would be like in heaven. Jesus knew that they didn't really want an answer to

their question; they were just trying to trap him. So Jesus showed them that they didn't understand the resurrection by saying: "In heaven, people do not get married or die; they are like the angels; they are the children of God and will live with God forever. Moses himself implies that people will live again in the passage about the bush, where he calls the Lord the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac and the God of Jacob. Now he is God, not of the dead, but of the living; for to him all people are in fact alive."
