


Week 3: Science Club: Static Electricity

Youth Perspectives on the STEM Ambassadors Programme



It was a privilege to welcome researchers' Dr Gareth Price Senior Research Fellow and Stuart Bevin both from the Sheffield Institute of Education / Science Education Team. As part of the school winning the **'Outstanding Stem Club'** of the year award early this year. Sheffield University are working on a research project that will seek to find out what young people think and feel about any experiences they have had with STEM ambassadors or other STEM enrichment and enhancement activities. Also, the views of young people who haven't engaged with a STEM professional or STEM event. This data will be used to

reflect on future directions for the STEM Ambassador programme.

Dear Parents and Carers,





THE GOSPEL IN CHURCH Sunday 9th October 2022



On the way to Jerusalem Jesus travelled along the border between Samaria and Galilee. As he entered one of the villages, ten lepers came to meet him. They stood some way off and called to him, "Jesus! Master!

Take pity on us." When he saw them he said, "Go and show yourselves to the priests." Now, as they were going away, they were cleansed. Finding himself cured, one of them turned back praising God at the top of his voice and threw himself at the feet of Jesus and thanked him. The man was a Samaritan. This made Jesus say, "Were not all ten made clean? The other nine, where are they? It seems that no one has come back to give praise to God, except this foreigner." And he said to the man, "Stand up and go on your way. Your faith has saved you."



Enjoy reading the Gospel overleaf (or below for younger children)

On his way to Jerusalem, Jesus went into a village. Ten men with leprosy, a terrible skin disease, stood a long way off. They shouted, "Jesus! Master! Take pity on us." Jesus said, "Go and show yourselves to the priests as the Law teaches us." As they went on their way they were all healed. But only one of the ten, a Samaritan, turned back praising God at the top of his voice and threw himself at the feet of Jesus and thanked him. Jesus said to the man, "Stand up and go on your way. Your faith has saved you."


